

THE HISTORY OF THE PIKE-PAWNEE VILLAGE SITE

The Pike-Pawnee Village Site or Hill Farm Site, designated 25WT1 by archaeologists, is a site near the village of Guide Rock in Webster County, Nebraska. It was the location of a village of the Kitkehahki band of the Pawnee people, in a region of the Republican River valley that they occupied intermittently from the 1770s to the 1820s.

The property was purchased by the Foundation in 1979. The primary goal of the Foundation in making the

purchase was, and is, to preserve the site and its historical and archaeological resources. The farm consists of 283 acres, comprised primarily of pasture. In 1966, two hundred acres were listed on the National Register of Historic Places, having been officially recognized as an important Pawnee community and as the site visited by Lt. Zebulon Pike in 1806 to confer with the Pawnee.

Directions From East:

Take I-80 West to NE-14 exit, EXIT 332, toward Aurora.

Turn left onto NE-14/S Highway 14. Continue to follow NE-14.

Turn right onto Highway 6/US-6 W/NE-14.

Turn left onto Road N/NE-14. Continue to follow NE-14.

Turn right onto US-136 W/Highway 136. Continue to follow US-136 W.

Turn left onto NE-78/Highway 78. Continue to follow NE-78 for 2.4 miles (going through Guide Rock) and then turn (veer) right onto a gravel county road. Continue about 4 miles to the site.

Look for "NSHSF" signs in Guide Rock which will take you directly to the site.

Directions From West:

Merge onto I-80 E

Take the US-183 exit, EXIT 257, toward Elm Creek/Holdrege.

Turn right onto US-183 S/Highway 183. Continue to follow US-183 S.

Turn left onto 7th St/US-136 E. Continue to follow US-136 E.

US-136 E becomes Highway 136.

Turn slight right onto G.H. Rd/US-136 E. Continue to follow US-136 E.

Turn right onto NE-78/Highway 78. Continue to follow NE-78 for 2.4 miles (going through Guide Rock) and then turn (veer) right onto a gravel county road. Continue about 4 miles to the site.

Look for "NSHSF" signs in Guide Rock which will take you directly to the site.

Pawnee Indian Museum near Republic, Kansas is built on another Pawnee village where one can still see the earthlodge depressions.
