









In honor of Women's History Month, we are excited to offer assistance to our friends working to restore the Picotte Memorial Hospital in Walthill. The creation of the Dr. Susan La Flesche Picotte Center will provide needed community services and a wellness clinic for the Omaha Tribe and the residents of the Walthill area. Our goal is to raise \$75,000 in additional funding for the Dr. Susan Le Flesche Picotte Historical Museum, one of several new features included in the restoration plan. The Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation is proud to help raise these funds.



Dr. Susan was the first indigenous person to become a physician in the United States. Born in the Nebraska Territory in 1865, she was the youngest child of the last formal chief of the Omaha Tribe. Concerned by the lack of medical attention paid to those living on the Omaha reservation, she was motivated to become a medical doctor.

On March 14, 1889, Dr. Susan graduated at the top of her class from the Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania. She returned home to Nebraska where she dedicated the rest of her life to treating patients and teaching knowledge of common health practices to avoid the spread of disease.

The Dr. Susan La Flesche Picotte Memorial Hospital opened in 1913 and was named a National Historic Landmark in 1993. In 2017, the Nebraska Commission on Indian Affairs formed a Susan La Flesche Memorial Advisory Committee to restore the historic hospital.

Open to tourists, school groups, and history buffs, the new Center will include a medical clinic offering a variety of health and medical services, an educational and youth programming area, a reading room, a community garden showcasing traditional medicinal plants, a social services and counseling area for local families, a sweat lodge, an entrepreneurial and technology center and a Native American cultural space.
