

Walk to the Rock Dedication



On Friday, July 28th and Saturday, July 29th, the Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation hosted dedications for Walk to the Rock.

The private dedication on July 28th, for those who donated \$1000 or more to the Walk to the Rock project, had over 100 people in attendance. Among those who attended were Senator Steve Erdman and his wife Kathy, Senator John Stinner, and his wife Rita and Platte Valley Bank President Hod Kosman. Senator Erdman spoke about the positive economic impact of the construction of the walking trails, which are another component of the recreation and education menu of western Nebraska.

The public dedication on July 29th saw a crowd of over 50 excited supporters. Among them was Kelly Durnal of Gering. Kelly is the grandson of Frank Durnal who donated the land on which Chimney Rock sits. Frank owned Chimney Rock and the land surrounding it and eventually sold the land to the State of Nebraska for the sum of one dollar. He owned one of the biggest ranches in the Bayard area.

Check presentation at Nebraska Prairie Museum in Holdrege

The Phelps County Historical Society was organized in 1966. Our first displays appeared in the halls of the courthouse, then later, in the vacated Salvation Army building located just north of the current Holdrege City Hall. On April 22, 1975, ground was broken a half-mile north of the Country Club on Highway 183 for a 154' x 120' steel structure, now known as the Nebraska Prairie Museum (NPM). The mission of the NPM continues to be a historical, interactive, resource for the community, through the collection of artifact, archival documents and memorabilia that explain the lifestyles of those who preceded us.

The Nebraska Prairie Museum received \$1,250 through the Statewide Grants Program for graphic panels, laminated description cards, and a graphic designer. We can't wait to see how they look!
