Each year, a project is selected as the "1942 Project" and the chosen project serves as a reflection of the Foundation's mission and reflective of the state. During 2022, the inaugural year for this project, and we shared the launch of the "Walk to the Rock" walking trail at Chimney Rock.

This year, the NSHS Foundation accomplished many goals; it was a year of tremendous outreach and engagement with the ENTIRE STATE. Your support is needed now more than ever.

Did you know that when this Foundation applies for grants from other foundations and organizations, one of the main questions is, "What percentage of your board are donors to your organization?"

This question poses difficulty for us because not all of our board or trustees are donors to the Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation. The best answer we can provide is that 100% of our board and trustees are donors, but we can't say that.

For nearly 20 years, I served as the director of the Museum of the Fur Trade. It was an incredible achievement to be able to state that our entire board, all 87 volunteers, all of the paid staff, and two-thirds of the 2,756 members were donors to the Museum. This fact highlighted the shared commitment to the mission of the Fur Trade. The overwhelming support filled us with pride. It is something we should strive for with the NSHSF!




You're Invited to the Walk to the Rock Public Dedication



Join us for the public dedication of Walk to the Rock, a 2.2 mile trail system circling Chimney Rock in Bayard, Nebraska. The dedication will be at the trailhead which is located across from the Chimney Rock Cemetery on County Road 98 in Bayard, and will begin at noon on Saturday, July 29.

Directions: Go past the Abbott Visitor Center and proceed to the "T" in the road. Turn right and go to the end of the road. The parking lot is on the right hand side, across from Chimney Rock cemetery.

The Gering Bakery's Chimney Rock cookies will be given to the first 200 visitors.



The Walk To The Rock Community Trail, connecting the Ethel S. and Christopher J. Abbott Visitors Center to the three larger loops as shown on the map, is dedicated to the western Nebraska community and all of our generous donors. While gifts of any size are welcome and appreciated, donations of \$1000 and above will receive name recognition and will be posted on the trail.
